Message Title: Fighting Faithfully — How to Wrestle with Disagreement

Scripture: Genesis 32:22-32 // Matthew 16:21-23 // Galatians 2:11-14

PART 1 – Wrestling with God

Genesis 32:22-32 - Jacob Wrestles with God

Reflection Questions:

- 1. What does Jacob's insistence—"I won't let you go until you bless me"—reveal about his spiritual hunger?
- 2. How does Jacob's wrestling reflect a transition from manipulating blessings to authentically receiving one?
- 3. Have you ever wrestled with God through prayer, disappointment, or confusion? What was the result?
- 4. Jacob limps after the encounter. What does this say about the cost—and the power—of transformation?

Key Point:

"Disagreement—even with God—can change us for the better."

Activity:

Write a short letter to God about something you're currently wrestling with. Don't edit—just be honest.

PART 2 - Rebuke and Redirection

Matthew 16:21-23 - Peter Rebukes Jesus and is Corrected

Reflection Questions:

- 1. What do Peter's words ("God forbid it, Master!") reveal about his understanding of Jesus' mission?
- 2. Why do you think Jesus' response was so sharp? What was He trying to protect or clarify?
- 3. How can correction be an act of love rather than rejection?
- 4. How can we tell the difference between well-meaning interference and spirit-led opposition?

C.S. Lewis Insight:

"You never know how much you really believe anything until its truth or falsehood becomes a matter of life and death."

How does this quote relate to Peter's reaction and your own experience of hard truths?

PART 3 – Facing a Friend

Galatians 2:11–14 – Paul Confronts Peter

Reflection Questions:

- 1. Why do you think Paul chose to confront Peter publicly?
- 2. How do you react when someone calls you out—defensive, receptive, dismissive?
- 3. What's the difference between confronting someone out of love vs. confronting someone to "win"?
- 4. Can you think of a time when confrontation led to deeper understanding and growth?

Key Quote:

"The gospel was always bigger than their egos."

Write down what it would look like for you to put the gospel before your ego this week.

REAL-LIFE ILLUSTRATION - Potluck Disagreements

Discussion Prompt:

Reflect on the potluck story. What did the lay leader's wisdom teach about priorities in conflict? Have you seen minor disagreements escalate over issues that weren't eternal?
